Although allotment provision is protected under various acts of Parliament and demand for allotment plots is high, allotments in the UK face increasing pressure from housing development with these valuable green spaces being eyed for new construction projects. One of many benefits of joining Bath Allotments Association is to add your voice to the work we do to make sure that decision-makers are fully aware of the many benefits that allotments offer and the need for them to be supported and protected.

Updates on Association Activities

Gateway to Muck! Or Leap of Faith overthe-edge?

Thanks to the hard work by, and persistence of, the site rep, Dasha Charlton, new access gates have finally been installed in the top fence to Abbey View allotments to allow easier tipping of leaf mulch onto this steeply sloping site. The cost was paid for by the WatermyPlot project and the aim is to encourage the use of mulches to reduce water usage.




