Trading Hut

The Trading Hut will be open as usual from 10.00-12.00 on 8th and 22nd November 2025. This will be the last opening until the New Year.

We will open in January 2026 for collection of seed orders, and we expect seed potatoes to arrive in February 2026. So, November is the last chance to buy garlic, shallots and onions which can still be planted now for a crop in the Spring.

Our Bid for Funds for Phase 2 of WaterMyPlot

In 2023 the Bath Allotments team bid successfully for funds from the Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) that developers pay to local authorities to invest in local infrastructure and facilities. We were awarded £14k from the CIL pot to which we added our own funds and volunteer hours to launch the WatermyPlot (WmP) initiative. The project has been very successful in delivering its aims which focus on rain-water capture and use, regenerative growing, encouraging biodiversity and improving allotment provision by bringing hard-to-let plots back into cultivation. We have reported on progress in our previous newsletters and there are more details of successful initiatives in news items below.

We are now bidding for a second year of funding to keep up the good work. The Council is consulting members of the local community about which projects they favour, so we need you to make your voice heard in support of our bid. Our bid is small in comparison to some of the others but is wide in its coverage and we add in matched funding and loads of volunteer hours. The consultation ends at 5 p.m. on Friday 7th November so please get your vote in before the deadline.

Membership Data

Encouraging helpful wildlife on your site: Pond life

Bath Allotments Association Biodiversity Group is undertaking a number of projects on allotments to encourage biodiversity. All projects are undertaken by volunteer plot-holders largely on their own plots. Their activities include education on the use of chemicals such as slug pellets and weed killers; provision of hibernacula, bug hotels, to encourage insects /pollinators and the creation of a few small ponds, like the one on King George's Road illustrated below. If you want to have a go at installing a pond, take a look at our top tips.



Tips for your small pond*

- Fill it with rainwater, tap water has chemicals that may inhibit growth.
- You don't have to keep it full, some animals benefit from varying water levels.
- Make sure there is a shallow edge so creatures can get in and out.
- No fish! Thet eat invertebrates and tadpoles
- · Chose native pond plants.
- Don't move frogspawn, it can spread disease
- If you have a solid fence around your pond site leave gaps to encourage migration.
- Be patient a pond takes time to settle

Some benefits of small ponds

- Supports pollinators bees, hoverflies and beneficial insects like ladybirds.
- Provides stepping stones for species to spread.
- Will add to biodiversity within weeks of setting up. Species to look out for include:
- Common frog.
- · Smooth newt.
- Water beetles.
- Diving beetles.
- · Dragonfly nymphs
- Caddisfly larvae.
- Dragonflies.
- Not to mention birds and bats.

A sad end to a long allotment history at Combe Down

Sadly, all the tenants have now been evicted from this 130-year-old allotment site. The Council has supported us very positively by officially listing the site as an Asset of Community Value and we are ready to act should the private landowner try to sell. We continue to fight to save the site, and we hope members can help too by engaging with the Council's consultation on its new Local plan. The proposal is to designate the Combe Down site as a Local Green Space. Your supportive comments could make all the difference.
